# SOLOMON ISLANDS: FINAL EXTENSION AND CONCLUSION OF NEW ZEALAND DEPLOYMENT TO SOLOMON ISLANDS INTERNATIONAL ASSISTANCE FORCE

November 2024

This publication provides a June 2024 Ministerial submission on the final extension and conclusion of New Zealand deployments to the Solomon Islands International Assistance Force. This was approved by the Prime Minister, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Minister of Finance, Minister of Defence and Minister of Police in June 2024.

The pack comprises a submission to Ministers from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, New Zealand Defence Force, and Ministry of Defence, Solomon Islands: Final extension and conclusion of New Zealand deployment to Solomon Islands International Assistance Force, dated 21 June 2024.

### Background

- 1. In November 2021, the security situation in Solomon Islands' capital Honiara rapidly deteriorated, resulting in civil unrest and rioting. On 29 November 2021, Cabinet agreed in principle to a New Zealand deployment in conjunction with Australia s6(a)


  s6(a) provided that a request for support was received from Solomon Islands (CAB-21-MIN-0510). Cabinet also authorised the Prime Minister, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Minister of Police, and the Minister of Defence to take decisions on the deployment as Ministers with Powers to Act (MWPTA).
- 2. After receiving a formal request for support from the Solomon Islands Government on 30 November 2021, MWPTA agreed to deploy up to 60 NZDF and 11 New Zealand Police (NZP) personnel for up to 30 days alongside Australia, Papua New Guinea, and Fiji. The Australian-led joint regional presence became known as the Solomon Islands International Assistance Force (SIAF) and was instrumental in helping to stabilise the security situation and prevent further violence and destruction of property in Honiara.
- 3. The deployment was subsequently extended several times and the number of personnel reduced significantly as the security environment improved. New Zealand's current mandate, which was last extended by MW PTA in September 2023 allows for the deployment of up to 15 NZDF personnel until 30 June 2024, although the NZDF maintains a steady state presence of four personnel in Honiara. Since 1 January 2022, no NZP personnel have been deployed under SIAF s6(b)(i)

Final extension and conclusion of the Solomon Islands International Assistance Force

4. The security situation in Solomon Islands has improved markedly from late-2021 when the SIAF was first deployed. The SIAF has played a key role in helping maintain calm. The rioting, violence and destruction of property seen in 2021 has not reoccurred. Tensions have heightened during potential flashpoints, such as the 2023 Pacific Games and National General Election in April 2024, however these have not resulted in any significant incidents.

- With only four NZDF personnel deployed to Solomon Islands and little equipment left incountry (most equipment was transported back to New Zealand on HMNZS Canterbury following the NZDF's support to the Solomon Islands election), the NZDF does not need additional time to pack down.

  Should New Zealand receive any additional requests to extend our SIAF deployment, officials will return to Ministers with advice on how to address these s6(a)

#### **Threat Assessment**

- 12. The overall mitigated health threat is assessed as **HIGH** due to the risk of infectious diseases and insect-borne diseases, in relation to the time period on the ground in the Area of Operations. Solomon Islands has well-established community transmission of COVID-19, s6(a)

#### **Detention Policy Framework**

- 13. As the proposed deployment falls within the scope of New Zealand's 2022 Detention Policy Framework as a 'coalition deployment' a Detention Risk Assessment has been undertaken under the Framework to assess the likelihood of NZDF personnel participating in a Detention Operation or being responsible for the transfer of Detainees under the SIAF.

- 15. Based on the current operation, and the specific roles NZDF personnel continue to fill under this deployment, there is a **low** chance of NZDF participating in a Detention Operation. The continued absence of any deliberate or contingency detention operation under the SIAF means there is currently no reasonable likelihood that NZDF personnel will participate in a Detention Operation under the SIAF.
- 16. Accordingly, the Detention Policy Framework is not further engaged. This assessment will be reviewed regularly during the course of this deployment including where the nature of the operation, planned tasks or NZDF roles change to ensure this assessment remains valid.

- 17. The estimated marginal cost of the proposed extended deployment of four NZDF personnel to Solomon Islands to 31 July 2024 is NZ\$0.053 million. The table below sets out the expenditure and funding arrangements for this deployment.
- 18. The estimated cost of the extension of the mission can be funded from within the existing baseline for Vote Defence Force: Operations Contributing to New Zealand's Security, Stability and Interests MCA Output Class 5.0.

Outside of the deployment, New Zealand currently has a so(a) defence relationship with Solomon Islands, with one non-resident Defence Adviser accredited to Solomon Islands. Personnel from the Royal Solomon Islands Police Force (RSIPF) have also been invited to attend on an ad hoc basis some courses under the NZDF Mutual Assistance Programme (MAP) and the NZDF Pacific Defence Gender Network. One NZDF Officer is based in Honiara under a secondment to the Pacific Islands Forum Fisheries Agency.



24. Aside from Defence, NZP advisors are in country under our International Development Cooperation (IDC) programme providing policing advisory support through the Solomon Islands Policing Support Programme (SIPSP). SIPSP focuses on community policing development and is an ongoing activity.
